STATE AID FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENTS**

Motion by Councilmember _____

WHEREAS, until 2024, cities, villages and towns had not received an increase in unrestricted state aid (AIM funding) in 15 years, significantly impacting their ability to provide essential services to their residents; and

WHEREAS, after a prolonged period without financial support, local governments finally received an increase of \$50 million in unrestricted state aid; and

WHEREAS, local officials express their gratitude for the \$50 million increase in unrestricted state aid, recognizing it as a positive step towards addressing long-standing funding challenges; and

WHEREAS, the State has referred to this new aid as Temporary Municipal Assistance, suggesting that such increase may not continue, jeopardizing the sustainability of crucial municipal programs and services; and

WHEREAS, the property tax cap further limits the ability of local governments to properly fund the programs and services their residents need; and

WHEREAS, increased and ongoing state aid for local governments is vital for maintaining infrastructure, public safety, housing and other municipal services; and

WHEREAS, the challenges of inflation, the increasing costs of labor and supplies, and the end of extraordinary federal aid only accentuate the need for consistent and predictable funding to effectively plan for the future and meet the growing needs of their residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City of Corning calls upon the Governor and the State Legislature to commit to continuing the additional \$50 million in unrestricted state aid in the 2025-26 State Budget and beyond, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Corning urges state officials to recognize the need for a long-term plan that ensures consistent and predictable increases in financial support for local governments that keep pace with inflation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution shall be sent to Governor Kathy Hochul, Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie, Senator Thomas O'Mara, Assemblymember Phil Palmesano, and the New York State Conference of Mayors & Municipal Officials (NYCOM).

Saturday night/Sunday morning we went through the twice annual tradition of changing the clocks. There has been a growing movement to end this tradition and "lock the clock". There are good reasons to stop the switch. But which time should we adopt? Standard Time or Daylight-Saving Time? Here is what I learned when looking into this.

Suicide rates increase by 6.25% in the aftermath of the spring transition.

In a Michigan study, there was a 24% increase in heart attacks the Monday after the spring transition.

In a Finnish study, there was an 8% increase in the rate of stroke after the spring.

In the US, fatal car crashes increase 6% in the week after the spring transition.

Switching the clock in the spring is clearly an issue. Thankfully, these negative results only last a few weeks. If the clock switch itself is the issue, we expect to also see these same disheartening spikes in the fall. But we don't. All these statistics stay at normal rates, so it is only in the spring that we exact this heavy toll on our society.

Our bodies are telling us something, we should listen and stop switching the clocks. We should "lock the clock" and stop the spring transition. But which time should we adopt?

The US has been down this path before. In January 1974, permanent Daylight-Saving Time was adopted. At the time 79% of Americans approved of the change. By 3 months later, the approval rate dropped to 42%. In late September of 1974, the full Congress passed a bill restoring Standard Time on October 27. Even during the long evenings of summer in Daylight-Saving Time, Congress acted to remove permanent Daylight-Saving Time. The summer enjoyment was not enough to counteract the negative impacts.

If permanent Daylight-Saving Time were adopted. The sun would rise on Corning at 8:35 am on the shortest day of the year. If you have kids, they would have walked to school completely in the dark and be in class before the sun rises. A small increase in child-vehicle accident and fatalities during those early morning walks was one of the negatives that shifted public opinion.

What about the energy savings of Daylight-Saving? Unfortunately, they don't materialize at the levels we are promised. More daylight means less need to turn on the lights in the house. That logic made sense years ago, but the widespread adoption of LED bulbs and continued proliferation of air-conditioning has shifted our energy consumption. We no longer need the extra daylight to save on light bulbs, but the extra hours at home during the summer daylight cause us to run the air-conditioner for longer.

Daylight-Saving Time seems like a good idea on paper, but the sum of the pieces doesn't add up to a big improvement over Standard time. Which is why I am speaking to you today. Legislation has been

introduced several times by U.S. Senator Marco Rubio, and by many state legislators including by NY State Senator Joe Griffo, calling for permanent Daylight-Saving time. As our representatives continue to debate the merits of keeping a consistent time, I hope you will make your voice heard and pass a resolution calling to “lock the clock” on permanent standard time. We need to show the legislature that we remember our history, that we can learn from and avoid repeating our past mistakes. Thank you.

Hilda Lando, 65 Wilson Street and Steuben County Legislator provided County updates from the legislature. She reported that that early voting has had a great turnout, the new budget will be presented November 12th, underpaid employee issue has been corrected and will not affect the budget, over 600 pounds of medication was received during the drug take back, the sticker store law will be enforced and investigated by the Sheriff's Office and Weights & Measures, and there was a property auction in October.
